Good People,

Since the shocking news of Charlie Kirk's murder, I've heard many people toss around words like "saint" and "martyr" to describe him. As for Charlie Kirk being a Christian saint, who am I to say? The New Testament talks of all Christian believers – including you and me – as "saints," and I absolutely agree with that. As for Charlie Kirk being a more particular kind of Christian saint, well, again, who am I to say? As scripture reminds us, we look on the outward face only, God alone sees the inward heart.

As for martyrdom, that's a slightly different story. We tend to think of, and modern dictionaries tend to define, "martyrdom" as giving up one's life in service to a religious or political belief – especially a belief held in the face of intense and dangerous pressure. Church history contains thousands and thousands of stories of Christian believers accepting death – sometimes in unspeakably cruel ways – rather than deny that Jesus is Lord. Christ means so much to some Christians that life literally makes no sense without him. So people "witnessed" to Jesus with their deaths. That's the root meaning of the Greek word "martyr": "witness." That's why so many older churches paint their front doors red – the color of life, the color of the Spirit, the color of blood. We enter into our faith through the "witness – the "martyrdom" – of the "saints."

But here's a hard truth about all that – in some ways, it is far easier to die for our values than to live them. Death gets attention, but in the long run, what keeps attention, what actually makes a difference to thinking, believing, and living, is the nature and quality of the life that preceded and led up to the death. Rather than deny that Charlie Kirk is a martyr, or argue with those Christians who claim him as such for themselves, I think we would all be better served by examining more closely the "witness" of Charlie Kirk's public words and deeds. To whom or what did Charlie Kirk martyr himself?

In his public ministry Charlie Kirk comforted the comfortable and afflicted the afflicted. Charlie Kirk preached a gospel that was good news for some – but not for all. Charlie Kirk routinely and unapologetically used inflammatory, racially charged language. Charlie Kirk consistently called for judgment and condemnation of others, seldom for self-confession or repentance. It's Charlie Kirk who famously decried "empathy." Charlie Kirk dedicated his public life to the powerful and privileged. And it is to the gods of power and privilege that Charlie Kirk "witnessed" with his death. I believe Christian witness is otherwise. I believe Jesus calls us to something different – something deeper, truer, and simpler, something both more demanding and more rewarding.

I think Christian martyrdom looks like that scene in *The Magnificent Seven*, where Charles Bronson's character explains bravery to the young boys who idolize him – to the detriment of their fathers. Bronson says: "You think I am brave because I carry a gun; well, your fathers are much braver because they carry responsibility, for you, your brothers, your sisters, and your mothers....And there's nobody says they have to do this. They do it because they love you, and because they want to. I have never had this kind of courage. Running a farm, working like a mule every day with no guarantee anything will ever come of it. This is bravery." And, may I add, this is not only great bravery, this is also real martyrdom. This is also true witness. This is what God asks of all us martyrs and of all us saints – to act responsibly and with love. Let's remember this in the days and nights to come. Amen.

Devotions – Chris Sterner read a devotion from Matthew about the need for nurturing relationships in our church with God and the rest of our community.

Time for Sharing - Lynn shared the joy of her trip to Alaska with her family. Darlene shared her joy about her grandson getting married soon.

Agenda – **additions**, **edits** - Pat announced that he had two additions to the agenda. The first concerned the Shepherding program while the second addition was related to some property updates regarding floor drains and fire extinguishers.

Approval of August 20, 2025 Minutes - On a motion by Chris, which was seconded by Darlene, the minutes of the August 20th meeting were approved unanimously.

Pastor's Report: Pat reported that Pastor Strong was unable to attend tonight's meeting and there would be no Pastor's report.

Finance Team Reports / Recommendations: Approval of Treasurer's August Reports – Chris reported that August was a good month with donations ahead of this period last year, but reminded that our financial position would be worse if we were paying a full-time Pastor. Pat noted that our positive financial trend has continued over the past few months. On a motion by George, seconded by Lynn, the Treasurer's report was approved unanimously.

Old Business:

Evangelism Team Update - A discussion was held about paying for a harpist for the church's Blue Christmas service. It was decided that a Thrivent grant would be pursued to cover the cost, but the church would pay the fee if this grant was not received. Donations from the congregation would also be sought to help cover the cost if the grant was not received.

Marty Party – G&G 's annual party to celebrate the Reformation is scheduled for October 25th in the church Pavilion weather permitting.

Grace and Glory 25th Anniversary Celebration – Lynn Wirth reported that there was no new information available about the celebration. The committee will meet again on October 2.

Hospitality Workshop - The workshop has been scheduled for Sunday, November 9.

Church Banners – All of the recently purchased banners have been received and the banner for the *Blessing of the Animals* event will be displayed shortly for that event which will take place on October 4th.

Movie Night - The movie night event featuring a film about the struggles faced by immigrants trying to enter the United States will be held on Sunday, October 19 from 3:00 - 4:30 PM.

Pie Auction Update - Lynn reported the pie auction plans are progressing nicely. Lots of members have signed up to donate pies and volunteer for the event which will be held on September 27. It was decided that the Posters that were created to advertise the event will be printed out for members to distribute in the community.

The pavilion will be cleaned this week in preparation for Sunday's outdoor service and should be in good shape for the auction the following weekend.

Shepherding Program: Pat reported that we now have four people signed up to be Shepherds and we are searching for two more volunteers.

Stewardship Campaign Theme Recommendations: Pat reported that three themes are being considered for this year's Stewardship campaign.

LT Nominating Team Recommendations: Pat requested that Chris and George join him as representatives from the LT on the Nominating Team for the 2026 Leadership Team.

New Business:

Bookkeeper Status - Chris advised that five people have expressed interest in the job as bookkeeper and their resumes are being reviewed. He and Pat are also trying to schedule a meeting with our retiring bookkeeper Regina to better understand the job and the software used.

Maurice and Regina Lange's departure. Maurice and Regina Lang have announced that they are leaving the congregation. No explanation was provided.

Security Team revival - Pat has suggested that we convene a meeting of greeters, ushers, and LT members to assess security at our services.

Property Update: The Church Garden has not had proper attention for some time. It is currently overgrown with weeds. Pat instructed Robert Candea to take the fence down surrounding the garden but to save the fence for future use. Robert will mow the weeds once the fence has been removed. It was discovered that the church's fire extinguishers have not been inspected for several years and a cost of \$257 has been approved to have them serviced. It has also been discovered that the floor drains in the restrooms and kitchen need to be rinsed periodically with hot water to prevent odor.

Closing Prayer and Adjournment: The closing prayer was led by President Pat McCloud. The mee6ng was adjourned at 8:45 PM. NEXT MEETING: October 15th @7:00 PM October

Excerpt from Bishop's Statement on Racial Profiling.

I am deeply troubled by incidents of racial profiling* that are happening across this country in the name of law enforcement and national security. Such inhumane treatment is being employed by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement in wanton immigration stops, targeting individuals based on race, ethnicity, language, occupation or location. In particular, I and many in this church lament the Supreme Court action of Sept. 8 in which the court granted a stay of a lower court's restraining order that had limited such enforcement practices in Los Angeles while judicial action is pending.

My concern is grounded in Scripture, ELCA social teaching and care for our neighbors. Scripture is clear: every human being is created in the image of God. Racial profiling denies that image and violates the dignity it confers. It is not only unjust — it is inhumane. This church's teaching is also clear, having expressed grave objections to patterns of racial, ethnic, and religious profiling because it "stigmatizes those who are innocent of any offense" (ELCA social statement The Church and Criminal Justice: Hearing the Cries, p. 40). Every neighbor, regardless of immigration status, deserves safety, dignity, and equal protection under the law. Racial profiling, a legacy of white supremacy, is rooted in the sin of racism (ELCA social statement Freed in Christ: Race, Ethnicity, and Culture, p. 5).

I want to be clear that, though this ruling effectively singles out the Latiné community, it also sets a precedent that will erode constitutional safeguards for all of us. I am reminded of the poem "First They Came," derived from a speech by German Pastor Martin Niemöller: "First they came for the socialists, and I did not speak out—because I was not a socialist. Then they came for the trade unionists, and I did not speak out—because I was not a trade unionist. Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out—because I was not a Jew. Then they came for me—and there was no one left to speak for me." This famous quotation illustrates how the systematic targeting of marginalized groups can escalate when people fail to defend others' rights, as happened when most people remained silent during the rise of Nazi persecution in Germany. It serves as a stark reminder of the consequences of quietism and inaction in the face of injustice.
